Craig Alston Birthday Concert at Jazzway

he birthday of multi-instrumentalist Craig Alston was celebrated August 11th at Jazzway 6004 in Baltimore. One of Baltimore's jazz most redoubtable figures on saxophone, Alston also plays bass and keyboard. The concert featured two other stellar musicians based in Baltimore, bassist Blake Meister and drummer Eric Kennedy—and on piano, the renowned New York native Larry Willis, who now resides in Baltimore.

Although the concert was billed as a celebration of Alston's birthday, the legendary Willis was strongly featured in the program with three of his originals. One was the beautiful tune "To Wisdom, The Prize," which has been performed and recorded by numerous jazz artists, most notably Roy Hargrove. The tune began pensively with thick, complex chords on the piano. From there, the band took the tune through a rollercoaster ride of emotions, rising from meditative to passionate and back down again. Alston's fiery sax solo soared to the rooftop before descending to a lyrical melodic phrase that introduced a mesmerizing bass solo, accented on drums by evocative cymbal riffs and rim taps and by Willis's strums on the strings of the piano.

Willis' second composition was "Ethiopia," an elegiac ballad, with Meister bowing a melody line, with touches of mystery added by Kennedy with mallets and cymbals. Willis's piano solo brought out a mood of operatic tragedy with a pulsing left-hand drone on two notes, leading to a coda of delicate right-hand dyads that culminated with all instruments in a dramatic, crashing finale.

Alston's fiery sax solo soared to the rooftop before descending to a lyrical melodic phrase that introduced a mesmerizing bass solo. . . . Later, the band swung hard on Cole Porter's "What Is This Thing Called Love?," with plenty of dazzling rapid-fire triplets in the solos.

The third Willis composition was "Brother Ed," a romping, upbeat swing tune with a bluesy feel but with unconventional harmonies. Meister's bass solo stood out as a funky, busy romp up and down the neck.

Three standards filled out the program: First, the everpopular "Alone Together," introduced on piano by a lefthand drone of fourths, followed by a series of dissonant chords in the right hand. The unusual arrangement displayed Willis's avant-garde leanings. Later, the band swung hard on Cole Porter's "What Is This Thing Called Love?,"

with plenty of dazzling rapid-fire triplets in the solos. The program ended with a blazing-hot rendition of Miles Davis's "Milestones."

Alston, Meister, and Kennedy all have performing histories with Willis, and the band played as a well-integrated unit, making seamless transitions within each tune. Each solo was accompanied by tasteful background touches from one or more of the other instruments. The group adroitly controlled the groove and dynamics of each tune.

All four of these award-winning musicians have distinguished careers as performers, composers, recording artists and/or educators, in the Baltimore-DC region and beyond. They have all played with notable musical collaborators and in world-class venues too numerous to name. Willis, the elder statesman of the group, has a six-decades-long career playing and composing in a range of genres, from avantgarde free jazz, to fusion, to hard bop, with some 300 recordings to his name. In the 1970s, he played a seven-year stint with Blood, Sweat & Tears.

Baltimorean Alston may be best known as the saxophonist for Fertile Ground. With this band, Alston recorded three albums and traveled the world, sharing its unique blend of jazz, soul and world music. He led the Eubie Blake Legacy Band for seven years, and he is the music director and instrumental music teacher for the Maryland Summer Arts Center.

Philadelphia native Blake Meister is a regular member of the Larry Willis Trio and Quintet. His debut album, *Septagon*, was named Album of the Year in 2016 by both CapitalBop and the Washington D.C. *City Paper*. A graduate of the Peabody Conservatory of Music of the Johns Hopkins University, Meister co-directs Peabody Preparatory's jazz programs.

Jazzway Hosts Legendary Saxophonist Benny Golson

axophonist Benny Golson is coming to Charm City for an historic week in American jazz. Internationally acclaimed as a musician, composer and educator, the NEA Jazz Master was recently inducted into the *DownBeat* Hall of Fame. He'll teach and perform while in Baltimore.

Golson is one of only two jazz greats still living who was seen in the famous 1958 photograph known as "Great Day in Harlem." Taken by Art Kane and published in *Esquire* magazine in 1959, the portrait captures 57 notable jazz musicians assembled in front of a brownstone and remains an important object in jazz history. (Thankfully, saxophonist Sonny Rollins is also still with us and these elder statesmen of jazz continue to make their indelible mark in the genre.)

Golson, who will celebrate his 90th birthday in January, 2019, will lead a symposium and master class at the Peabody Institute of The Johns Hopkins University on Friday, September 14th. The next evening, he'll perform in concert with his longtime pianist Sharp Radway, award-winning bassist Kris Funn, and drummer John R. Lamkin III, who has been instrumental in coordinating the Baltimore appearances.

In an intimate VIP concert at Jazzway 6004 on September 15th, The Benny Golson Quartet will perform famous tunes from his vast repertoire such as "Killer Joe," "Whisper Not," "I Remember Clifford," and "Stablemates." This special concert will give jazz fans the opportunity to enjoy a living legend in a cozy and cordial atmosphere, hosted by Marianne Matheny-Katz and Howard Katz in their house concert venue. In addition to great music, guests will be treated to soft drinks, entry in a raffle, and a buffet featuring dessert, fruit, cheese and appetizers after the concert. The ticket price is \$60 and all tickets must be purchased in advance from the website jazzway6004.org. The telephone number is 410-952-4528.

A related Community Concert at UMBC with Golson was originally scheduled for the same weekend as a collaboration

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between UMBC and Jazzway 6004. That event, which is being rescheduled for the spring of 2019, will give jazz fans of all ages a rare opportunity to hear the same jazz star in a larger venue for a more modest ticket price. Music students from any Maryland college or university will be invited to attend and will receive a huge discount on tickets. Details will be announced soon. The UMBC concert will be held in the Earl and Darielle Linehan Concert Hall, located in the UMBC Performing Arts & Humanities Building at 1000 Hilltop Circle, Baltimore, MD 21250. Check the Jazzway website for the official announcement of this concert.

Jazz lovers who attend the Jazzway 6004 event on September 15th and the students who enjoy a classroom experience with Golson will likely remember the experience for the rest of their lives. It's not every day that you meet and greet a living legend!

Eric Kennedy, also a Baltimore native, is well known throughout the region as a drummer, vocalist, composer, and jazz educator. He is a member of several Baltimore-based ensembles as well as co-founder of groups Dreamworld, Kinetic Sounds, and Simply Eric with Eric Byrd and Eric Wheeler.

The concert took place in the spacious hillside home of Marianne Matheny-Katz and her husband Howard, who have hosted concerts there for over ten years. At the end of the concert, a raffle was held, with three people winning a copy of Meister's CD. Then a birthday cake was served to Alston and "Happy Birthday" sung. The enthusiastic audience of some 50 people shared the cake and mingled convivially with the artists in an upstairs post-concert social hour, helping to celebrate not only Alston's birthday but the spectacular music they had just enjoyed from an outstanding band of musicians.

Liz Fixsen is a jazz pianist, jazz vocalist, and jazz enthusiast. She has written numerous articles and reviews for the Baltimore Jazz Alliance over the years and has served for several years on the BJA board. She teaches Professional Writing at the University of MD and also works for The Phillips Agency and Jazz Beyond Borders doing promotions of jazz and world-music artists.

Peabody Gets Its Man

fter nearly a year of searching the globe for distinguished candidates, Peabody Conservatory of The ■ Johns Hopkins University selected internationally renowned trumpeter Sean Jones to lead its jazz program, beginning in the 2018-19 academic year. Jones has been appointed the Richard and Elizabeth Case Chair in Jazz Studies.

Who better to force the storied institution onward and upward than Jones, the forty-year-old former wunderkind who has played with virtually everybody who is anybody in classic, contemporary and fusion jazz? Jones has performed in diverse formats such as orchestras, big bands and legacy bands. As soloist, bandleader, composer, educator and activist, artistic excellence and transcendence are ingrained in Jones's vision.

Johns Hopkins University's HUB At Work quotes Jones as being "thrilled to lead the future of American music education" at Peabody, where his duties will include judging auditions, conducting master classes, and assembling student ensembles. Peabody Dean Fred Bronstein said he welcomes Jones as the "perfect choice" to lead a new chapter for jazz there and in Baltimore.

As I read about Jones's professional background, his energy and work ethic astounded me. His commitment, vision, and ambition impressed me. His thirst for sharing jazz humbled me.

Jones's trumpet playing style has been described as robust yet lyrical. He believes his style encompasses those of Clifford Brown, Woody Shaw and Freddie Hubbard, with a "sprinkle" of gospel. He has toured and recorded with singers Dianne Reeves and Nancy Wilson. In 2010 Jones played on the Tutu Revisited Tour with composer, musician, and producer Marcus Miller. The following year he played on the Tribute to Miles Tour with Herbie Hancock and Wayne Shorter. He has been a sideman for Hancock and versatile luminary Jimmy Heath. Jones played lead trumpet in the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra for six years. The trumpeter currently records on Mack Avenue Records.



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As an educator, Jones's teaching background includes stints at Duquesne University and Oberlin Conservatory. He served as chair of the brass department at Berklee College of Music, artistic director of the Pittsburgh Jazz Orchestra, and artistic advisor at NYO Jazz, an intensive summer program for emerging players 16-19 years of age. In addition, he lectures and offers master classes and clinics around the globe.

If Jones's experiences as musician, band leader, composer, educator and artistic director predict future accomplishments, Peabody Conservatory has found its "main man." Congrats, Peabody. We can't wait!

Gilbert H. Richards was able to briefly interview Sean Jones while the trumpeter was on tour. Here are some of Jones's thoughts on topics ranging from mentors to his new job at Peabody.

About his high school mentor, Essotto Pellegrini: Anything was possible on the trumpet.

About Miles Davis: No musician should ever get comfortable. He should be pushing boundaries, exploring new frontiers in compositions and sounds. . . . Miles knew how to hire people to create the sounds he wanted. . . . [He] sustained the integrity of the trumpet sound.

About Wynton Marsalis as director of Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra: He worked toward his vision 24/7. [He made me believe that] anything could be achieved—if he believed you could.

About jazz: You can almost go wherever you feel like going, no matter what the structure.

About Peabody: I couldn't live with myself if I hadn't taken the challenge. I relish the chance to modernize and grow the jazz department.
